From The Minister

How great it feels to be back in the thick of things at FUS, after my wonderfully renewing sabbatical! The annual congregational meeting last night was a bright culmination of a very positive and productive year for the Society. Many thanks go to Chris Bubser and the Board for their careful preparation of the agenda, and for leading a crisp, fun meeting that covered a lot of ground without ever getting bogged down. Together we approved a responsibly forward-looking budget, as well as important resolutions about stopping the use of torture, and encouraging instant run-off voting. We said good bye and thanks to folks leaving the board, and leaving the congregation for new adventures elsewhere in the world, and we honored Bob and Margaret McCoy as the third recipients of the Dueltgen Congregational Service award. We thanked the Sabbatical Committee for their excellent service, and heard a report on the beginnings of the work of the new Strategic Planning Committee. Prior to the meeting being called to order, we enjoyed a delightful *free* indoor picnic dinner – this may have something to do with our best attendance in a long time!

I am particularly interested in another item that was presented to the congregation at this meeting; the Statement of values and expectations for FUS members. In case you weren't at the annual meeting, or didn't get a copy there, you can find a copy of this statement in this newsletter – it's the green enclosure. This document comes from the work of the Safe Congregations taskforce over the past two years. This group examined many levels of our community life, including practical matters like screens for the windows, and the need for a fire drill. We met with representatives of the fire department, and our insurers, to discuss risk management.

Another issue which the UUA suggests that a Safe Congregations taskforce consider has to do with policies of behavior, especially for those in leadership, and those who work with children. While every community hopes it will never happen in their group, accusations of misconduct are far more destructive in congregations that do not have policies in place for addressing them than they are where such policies have been formulated and publicized. The document which is now before the congregation has been developed with consultation from the Board of Trustees and the staff, and is ready to put forward for wider consideration. It has been presented at membership orientations for the past year, to give new members a sense of our community expectations.

Policies such as this serve several functions. Perhaps most importantly, they help us all as members to be aware of what constitutes acceptable standards within this community of liberal values. In addition to that, they also protect the congregation in two ways. In the event that an accusation of misconduct is made, where no such policy exists, both members and leaders are often unsure of how to proceed. They may either try to sweep the problem under the rug, and keep everything secret, which can result in even greater damage being done, as well as undermining the integrity of the community. Or they may err in the other direction, with everyone publicly advocating his or her opinions and conclusions, which generally makes for lasting hurt feelings and a lack of structure, respect,

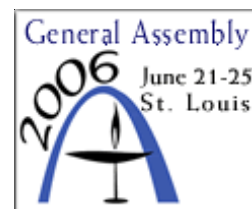

and dignity.

Where a Statement of Values and Expectations does exist, along with an implementation procedure, congregational leaders can proceed with confidence to confront an accusation. Even though the process will necessarily be unpleasant, it can be handled in a way that protects the well-being of the community. And, should litigation arise as a last resort, the fact that such policies are in place serves to demonstrate the good faith efforts of the congregation to create a safe environment for its members.

I urge you to look over the statement, as well as the implementation procedures, and think about them carefully. We will take the coming year as a time of conversation and feedback, before considering a congregational vote at the 2007 annual meeting. I hope that we will have an opportunity for focused discussion at a forum this fall, and at a Conversation with the Trustees following an Assembly on another Sunday. In the meantime, if you have responses or suggestions, I would be happy to receive them in writing, either in my office mailbox, or by e-mail.

I anticipate a very stimulating series of Summer Assemblies starting on June 11, and I look forward to bringing the water that I save from my summer adventures – don't forget to collect yours! – to our first gathering in September.

Who do UU Think You Are?

In my 3+ years working as a religious professional in two separate Unitarian Universalist congregations, it never ceases to amaze me how so many of our visitors have found us after taking Belief-O-Matic, a personality quiz about one's religious and spiritual beliefs. The independent host website www.beliefnet.com, says about the quiz:

"Even if YOU don't know what faith you are, Belief-O-Matic knows. Answer 20 questions about your concept of God, the afterlife, human nature, and more, and Belief-O-Matic will tell you what religion (if any) you practice, or ought to consider practicing."

You answer questions on the topics of afterlife, deities, and suffering. Your quiz results give a percentage breakdown of your "spiritual tendencies" and offers resources to go to for more information. While the essence of the quiz is somewhat campy (a warning states they assume no legal liability for the ultimate fate of your soul), it has become an increasingly popular resource for folks on a religious quest.

So, next time you're online, check it out! At a minimum, you'll be entertained for ten minutes. But you may find something surprising about yourself, too!

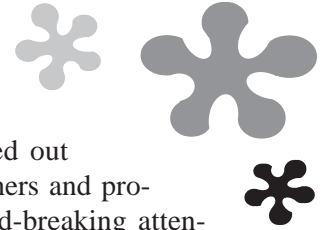

THE 2006 AUW/FUS ALLIANCE WOMEN'S RETREAT A SUCCESS!

Over the weekend of April 21-23 accompanied by gorgeous weather, eighty UU women gathered at the Koinonia Retreat Center on the shores of Lake Sylvia near Annandale, MN. Months of planning culminated in a wonderful gathering of women from both the First Universalist Church and the First Unitarian Society.

The weekend consisted of an opening ritual; a keynote address by Rev. Claire Cassell on "Expanding our Connections: Heart to Earth"; several playshop and workshop sessions which involved creating music, moving yoga, arts and crafts; a knitting project which will result in knitted bears to be sent to Africa to young people affected by HIV/AIDS; writing workshops; exploration of a personal religious place led by Sarah Barber Braun; nature hikes led by our own Dianne Rowse; a discussion group lead by our own unsurpassable Ruth Agar; massages; a "Sensation Station," a "Meditation Station" and a "Conversation Station." Our own Wanda McCaa taught a beading project in the Craft Chapel. And there were opportunities for singing and exercise and dancing throughout the weekend.

Most importantly, it was an opportunity for women of all ages to enjoy one another for two days of activities and great food. And it was a chance for the women of FUS to connect with the women of First Universalist Church. This is the 7th Annual Retreat. The women from the FUS comprised 1/8th of the registrants. We hope to increase that number to 15 to 20 percent next year. We urge our women of FUS to consider joining in on the 2007 Annual AUW/FUS Alliance Retreat which will be held in late March at the Mt. Habitat for Humanity

Habitat for Humanity Summer Volunteer Opportunity

The Unitarian Universalist Affordable Housing Partnership (UUAHP) member congregations are taking responsibility for providing 15 to 18 volunteers for one week during June to help build a house. The dates are June 12 through June 16. All skill levels are welcome. You can volunteer for one day, two days, the whole week. Some people use a few of their vacation days working on a Habitat site. Work hours are 8:30 to 4:30. You will be working with other Unitarians, possibly volunteers from a corporate sponsor and/or volunteers from another church. You may meet and work with members of a family buying a Habitat home. Putting in hundreds of "sweat equity"



hours is a requirement for a qualifying family. The exact location of the build has not yet been determined.

For safety reasons, children under the age of 14 are not allowed on-site. Teenagers 14-15 must have one-to-one supervision from a parent or adult friend. One adult supervisor

is required for every four 16 or 17 yr. olds working on the site. 18 year olds do not need supervision but they cannot act as supervisors for younger people.

Want to help but can't be on site? How about bringing a mid-morning or mid-afternoon snack for the workers? Another possibility would be to organize a crew of cooks to provide lunch for the workers for one day. *You will be the most popular people on the site.*

UUAHP will be considered a Contributing sponsor. This means that we will need to raise at least \$6000 as well as providing volunteer labor.

justFair Lobby Day



Over 5,000 people rallied on the Capitol lawn at OutFront Minnesota's *justFair Lobby Day*.

“In the end, we will remember not the words of our enemies, but the silence of our friends.”

At *justFair Lobby Day* on Thursday April 27, Tyrone Terrill of the Saint Paul Human Rights Commission invoked these words of Dr. King at the Rally for Fairness. The more than 5,000 people gathered on the Minnesota Capitol lawn responded with thunderous applause. That's because over the past several months, more and more friends of the GLBT community have ended their silence. So many allies joined their GLBT brothers and sisters that this year, 92% of Minnesota legislators met face-to-face with fair-minded constituents at justFair Lobby Day! That means people came from nearly every corner of the state to stand together and show their power.

The silence was ended by allies like Saint Paul Mayor Chris Coleman and ELCA Bishop Lowell Erdahl, who gave impassioned speeches about GLBT human rights. Eliot Seide of AFSCME, Javier Morillo of SEIU, and Tim Stanley of Planned Parenthood also spoke, stressing the need for progressive organizations to stand with the GLBT community. Polar explorer Ann Bancroft ended the rally by comparing the struggle for GLBT equality to her adventures: "Expedition people are by nature hopeful people. Nothing comes easily nor quickly, and the journeys are often very long. Like my long expeditions, we as a community face similar conditions to those on the ice. Sometimes uncertainty of our leaders' moral compass, the harshness of a sometimes hateful tongue and sometimes a chill in the air as we move through the legislative session. But like on an expedition, our perseverance will prevail."

justFair Lobby Day was a huge success--we had our biggest turnout ever, keeping it firmly rooted as the largest state lobby day for GLBT equality in the country, but our work doesn't end after lobby day. OutFront Minnesota has persevered for 20 years, and we'll continue to work to make our state a better place for GLBT Minnesotans for many years to come.
