From The Minister

Ministry is one of those professions in which either you have no boss but yourself (or, as the orthodox might say, God), or else you have 500 bosses — however many members are in the congregation. Of course, each of those bosses has his or her own idea about appropriate priorities and use of time; what constitute the essential tasks of ministry, and what should be left on the table at the end of the day when time runs out. I try to operate by the maxim of one of my seminary professors, who taught us that the production of positive feedback is not the central goal of ministry — and yet feedback of some sort is essential to both productive work and personal growth.

On the one hand, there is no lack of both appreciation and advice offered to me on a personal level, and I am grateful for all of it. Many people, both members of the FUS and outsiders, take the time to let me know when something I do particularly touches them — or, less often, annoys them — and this is important information for me to hear. But it is, by definition, anecdotal. And sooner or later there is also a need for a somewhat more structured process, by which the institution can elicit the congregation's response to a series of specific questions, and assess my contribution to our shared ministry.

The members of the Ministerial Relations Committee and I have been working to create a questionnaire that will help us in that assessment process. Thanks to the technical expertise of Shelley Shreffler, it can be found at the on-line site Survey Monkey, specifically at: http://www.surveymonkey.com/s.aspx?sm=BxMR_2fA5EJyiBBRj1vaun1Q_3d_3d.

You can copy this address into your browser, or from the FUS website you can click on the button that says “MRC survey,” and it will take you right there. The advantage to us of the on-line format is that the tabulation of the completed surveys happens automatically, so if this method works for you, we encourage you to use it. However, if the on-line mode isn't accessible for you, paper copies of the survey can be picked up from the FUS office. We will also be happy to put one in the mail to you, if you call and let us know that you want it. Completed surveys can be mailed back, or dropped off in the Ministerial Relations Committee box in the office.

The survey form will be available throughout the month of June, and then the MRC and I will spend some time contemplating what the results tell us. Look for a preliminary report in the September newsletter. And let me reiterate what I know

From The Ministerial Intern

June is a month of beginnings and endings: graduation ceremonies, the completion of class work and internships, the end of the program year at FUS, weddings, and of course opening the lake cabin for the summer. Each of these life passages marks an ending to some part of our lives but also opens the door to a new beginning, complete with rituals intended to help us navigate the transition we're making. And as we mark these and other changes in life, whether big or small, there is a common question that I suspect we've all asked, perhaps with varying degrees of delight, anticipation, fear, or curiosity: what now? (In the case of the summer cabin, perhaps the answer comes easily: rest and relaxation!)



In her book *What Now?*, based on her commencement address at Sarah Lawrence College, author Ann Patchett explores the feelings that come with achieving a goal or dream or ending a major chapter in one's life, and suggests that the uncertainty of change and new opportunities can be met with joy as well as anxiety. She writes:

What now is not just a panic-stricken question tossed out into a dark unknown. What now can also be our joy. It is a declaration of possibility, of promise, of chance. It acknowledges that our future is open, that we may well do more than anyone expected of us, that at every point in our development we are still striving to grow.

As we look to the future and its possibilities, Patchett also invites us to reflect on what we've accomplished and to be grateful to everyone who has helped us along the way. In this spirit, I want to say thank you for the honor and the privilege of serving as your intern minister. It has been a very transformative experience to minister to you and with you. I am grateful for everything I've learned and for the wisdom and support each of you has shared with me in your calling as a teaching congregation. Thank you!

I am especially grateful to Kendyl, Jan, and the entire staff of FUS for the way they have graciously shared their knowledge and time, helping me to grow and to learn the arts of ministry as we worked together to build up this beloved community. Thank you!

◆**7/6/08 ASSEMBLY: “Native Americans in Minnesota”**

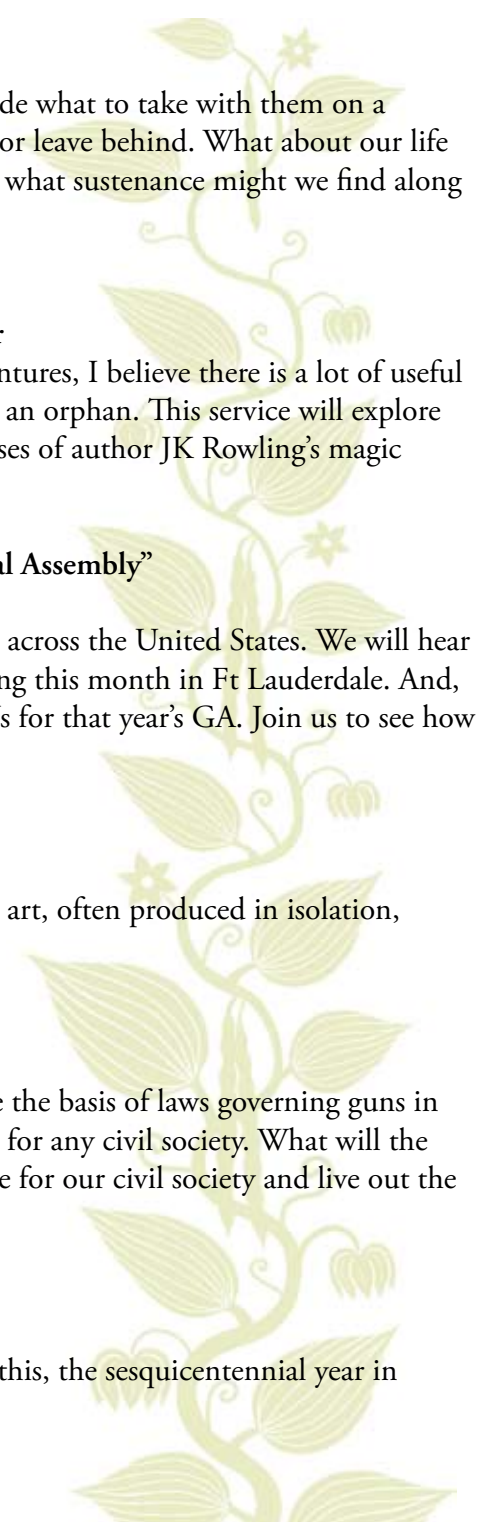

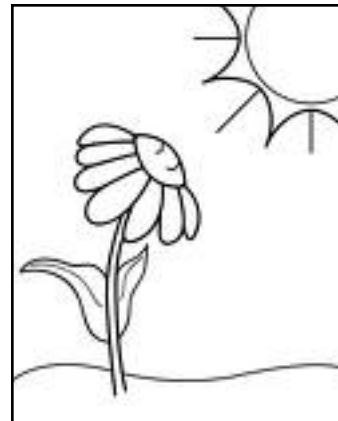

I hope everyone has a peaceful relaxing summer. Take good care!

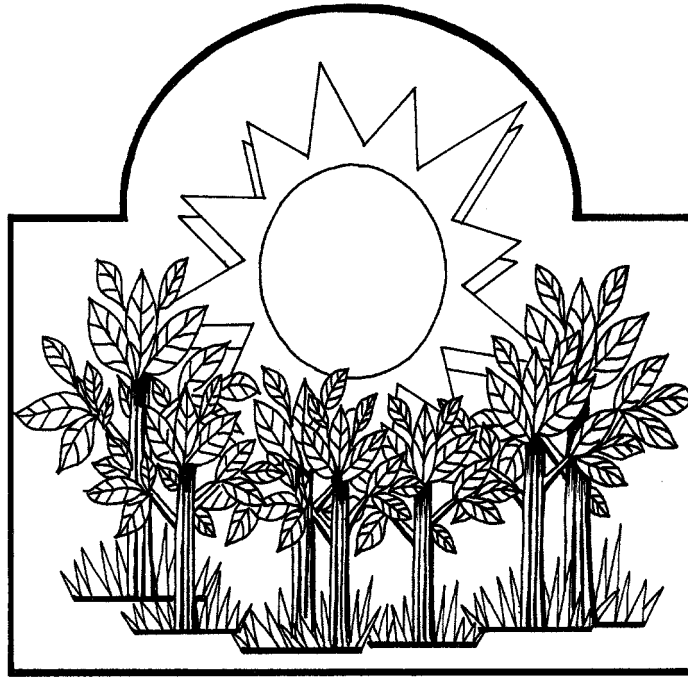
