From the Minister

The last time the UUA General Assembly was held here in the Twin Cities, I was finishing my junior year in college. It was 1975, and I had never been to a GA; I didn't attend that one, either. It would be another six years before I had both the resources and the motivation to make my way to the great gathering of Unitarian Universalists from across the continent, in 1981, in Philadelphia. I still remember how overwhelming it was, seeing all the workshops and programs, and feeling that I wanted to attend every single one, as well as hearing several thousand of my fellow members and future parishioners singing together – now **that** is a hymn! If you have never heard it, there is no way to describe the visceral impact of being surrounded by a huge crowd of folk who all think of themselves as UUs. It's exhilarating, and humbling; it is great to know that we are not alone, and mystifying that each of us can be unique, and so diverse, even within that common identity.

Now, 35 years later, General Assembly is back in our town. It's a once-in-a-generation opportunity to experience the thrill while being able to sleep in your own bed, and avoid cross-country travel. It's also a chance to demonstrate to a national audience the vibrancy of Unitarian Universalism here in our progressive Midwestern Twin Cities. At least, it may offer some positive publicity and news coverage, or give you the opening to say to friends and relatives, "My church's national convention is meeting at the Minneapolis Convention Center this week." There are several options for registration; if you can't come for the weekdays, on Thursday and Friday, you can register for the weekend only. If you will be there on Thursday, don't miss this workshop: *Good Without God: Something Nonbelievers Can Believe In* Thursday, 2:45-4:00 p.m. – Minneapolis Convention Center – Ballroom A Focusing on the heart of Humanism, we can strive to live well, build community, and be good—without higher powers. To millions searching for something to believe in, we offer comfort and hope, affirming our common ability to live ethical, fulfilling lives, aspiring together for the greater good of all. The presenter will be Greg M. Epstein, an ordained Humanist Rabbi, who serves as the Humanist Chaplain at Harvard University. The book, *Good Without God*, is available at the FUS bookstore, and will be the subject of a book discussion sponsored by our Humanist Center here at FUS on June 20.

In addition to the five days of UU General Assembly events, our congregation will also be hosting a special one-day gathering of UU Humanists from around

Update on Currie Avenue Partnership - The Currie Avenue Partnership is a collaboration between the Minneapolis Downtown Council and the Downtown Congregations to End Homelessness. 150 homeless people with disabilities, often involving mental health or chemical dependency, qualifying them for the state's Group Residential Housing program, will be housed. These disabilities have prevented the citizens from negotiating the system to access the help they qualify for. Once they are enrolled, state and federal funds ensure ongoing support. In five months \$350,000 was raised. Ten caseworkers have been hired and some frequent residents of homeless shelters on Currie Avenue are being

housed. FUS members contributed generously to this effort early in 2010.

A BIG THANK YOU to all who contributed to this effort and to all who regularly support the efforts to end homelessness and reduce poverty with cash contributions, by acting on DCEH Action Alerts and through volunteer activities.
